ACCESS & SECURITY TASK FORCE UPDATE

A task force of Session that is reviewing access and security has begun to draft up a guide for MPC. This includes how we utilize the 19 doors we have, what we are doing in terms of locking them (one concept in evaluation is "locked unless monitored"), keys to doors and their management, surveillance (CCTV, lighting, and alarms), communication, and training (for things like CPR/medical issues, evacuation, and event procedures). The guide is being organized around visitor planning, access & security strategies, and rental requirements. If anyone has ideas they would like to share, feel free to reach out to any of the task force members: Randy McCourt, Chris Ulum, Clay Morgan, Tom Jones, and Gary Cayton.

PRAYER

You're invited to call or email the church with any prayer requests (joys, concerns, and updates) you have, and they will be forwarded on to the Prayer Team, who continue to meet via Zoom each Tuesday.

MINISTERING TO EACH OTHER

Our church family includes several "homebound" individuals – those who now have temporary or permanent limitations reducing their involvement in the church. When our homebound congregants are unable to come to church, we can take the church to them through prayers, visits, rides to church, and letters. Please inform the deacons as you become aware of someone who is homebound.



SESSION UPDATE

At the April meeting, Session:

- Concurred with CNC recommendation for Pat Johnson to fill a deacon vacancy in the class of 2024.
- Approved calling a congregational meeting on April 28, 2024 following the worship service to elect Pat Johnson to fill a deacon vacancy.
- Approved installing Dave Tomastik and Pat Johnson on May 5, 2024.
- Noted Heather Hellman, CRE was commissioned on April 14, 2024 and is now Temporary Pastor, CRE. Jennifer Ackerman is Transitional Pastor.
- Heard commissioner reports from Karen Black, Heather Hellman, and Jennifer Ackerman on the Presbytery Spring Stated Meeting they attended April 19-20. Highlights included motions and overtures in support of relationships with local indigenous communities. Barbie's Village at the former Laurelhurst Presbyterian Church and the Warm Springs Presbyterian Church are two such communities. The Presbytery of the Cascades (POC) concurred with the "Becoming Free From Plastic Pollution" overture which will go to the 226th General Assembly later this year. John and Sylvia Dilworth transferred from the POC to Inland Presbytery. The Warm Springs Presbyterian Church is celebrating their 150th anniversary on August 10. Everyone is invited to the salmon bake RSVP by June 1. Contact Karen Black for details.
- Heard an update from the Security Task Force. They are still gathering and organizing information.
 Randy was asked by POC to share what the MPC Security Task Force has done and where we are at,
 so he gave his presentation to Session. Randy summarized the process and information they have
 gathered so far. The next steps for the task force are to coordinate processes with Dove Preschool,
 develop guidelines & processes, and then get Session approval. A request for better
 communication on implementation of the new practices was made.
- Heard from CE Committee that VBS registration is open and that we need to do more advertising. VBS is June 17-21.
- Heard that the Missions committee bought 12 Chromebooks for the Stephens Creek Crossing Homework Club using designated funds.
- Heard from the Finance & Administration Committee that after the first quarter of 2024, we are within about \$1800 of breaking even. A suggestion was made to apply for a Barnabas Grant through POC.
- Heard from the Personnel Committee that policy updates have been postponed until summer.
- Heard Jennifer Ackerman has a book out titled **Preaching the Gospel of Justice**.
- Heard from the Treasurer that the 2023 Financial Records Review was completed by Janet Lowrey, CPA and Kathy McCourt. The records are in good shape. One recommendation was made for improvement.



BUILDINGS & GROUNDS

Greetings MPC Family - Here's what we were up to this month:

- Backflow testing was completed on March 26th. All devices passed and our information was sent to City of Portland. The technician noted a slight leak on one of the test ports, but it stopped leaking by the time we left.
- Discussed stage lighting operation: there is one light that is currently turned off due to the glare it causes on the face of the speaker for online viewers.
- We scheduled an All Church Work Day for **Saturday, May 4th** starting at 9am. Our main task is to spread fresh bark along the entire front planter area. We'll also provide a light lunch at the end of the work (aiming around 11am).
- Fire Alarm Testing was performed April 11th.
- Front entry closing mechanisms were adjusted to prevent closing too fast and potentially contacting folks as they enter.
- Regarding our downstairs wall murals: Amy is in discussion with a couple other members to plan to refresh and/or paint over them.
- Clay had his first round of mowing completed without incident, and Dennis followed two weeks later (photos below).

HYGIENE ESSENTIALS DONATION DRIVE FOR TEENS IN FOSTER CARE

Starting in May and running through Sunday, June 16th, the Mission Committee will collect hygiene essentials including full-size shampoo, conditioner, toothpaste, and toothbrushes for **Howard's Heart (howardsheart.org)**, a local non-profit organization that serves teens in foster care.

Sometimes, children entering a new foster care situation have nothing except the clothes on their backs, and Howard's Heart puts together boxes of essentials to help

them in their transition to a new home. Foster care teens also have an opportunity to visit the Howard's Heart shop located at Lloyd Center to choose items for themselves.

We are looking for full-size shampoo and conditioner of different varieties and for different hair types, as well as toothbrushes and toothpaste. Donations can go into the red barrel in the fellowship hall. The drive will run through **Sunday, June 16th**.
